Hurricane Conditions (HURCONs)

HURCON 5: Winds in excess of 58 mph could arrive within 96 hours

HURCON 4: Winds in excess of 58 mph could arrive within 72 hours

HURCON 3: Winds in excess of 58 mph could arrive within 48 hours

HURCON 2: Winds in excess of 58 mph could arrive within 24 hours

HURCON 1: Winds in excess of 58 mph could arrive within 12 hours

HURCON 1E: Emergency – Winds of 58 mph and/or gusts of 69 mph or greater are occurring

HURCON 1R: Recovery – Destructive winds have subsided and are no longer forecast to occur; non-essential personnel remain indoors

***Prior to HURCON 1, make sure to take all necessary steps to prepare for the upcoming storm: Have hurricane preparedness kit ready, fill vehicles with fuel, secure any loose objects, etc.

Hurricane Preparedness

Hurricanes and the hazards that accompany them are Hurlburt Field's largest natural threat.

Hurricane season starts 1 June and lasts through 30 November.

Although these months are designated as high probability time frames, hurricanes can also occur outside of this window.

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Emergency Notification

AtHoc

AtHoc is the Air Force Installation Warning System. In the event of a Natural Disaster, attack, or any instance in which a warning is to be made, AtHoc will send out text message updates, as well as phone calls to notify individuals of the event of concern.

To receive notifications using AtHoc, follow the steps below:

Register by Following These Steps:

-On the bottom right corner of your desktop, click “^” and locate the white and purple globe

-Right click the white and purple globe and select “Access Self-Service”

-Fill in information on Registration page

-Click “My Profile” and select the “edit” icon in the upper right corner

-Enter all applicable information for maximum usage

-Once information is verified select “Save” in top right corner.

Air Force Personnel Accountability and Assessment System (AFPAAS)

- Standard method to account, assess, manage, and monitor the recovery of AF personnel and their dependents
- Provides valuable information to all levels of the Air Force chain of command
- Allows commanders to make strategic decisions which facilitate a return to stability
- Search AFPAAS in portal home screen for link to update profile, it should match DEERS
- Air Force BE READY app has good info and link to AFPASS

Make a Plan

Prior to an incoming storm, sit down with your family and create an emergency plan. Be sure to add a shelter plan, evacuation route, and a communication plan, while also accounting for your households specific needs (small children, elderly, pets, dietary needs, etc.).

Build a Kit

Having a Disaster Supply Kit ready is going to help you be prepared for any natural or man-made disaster that you may encounter.

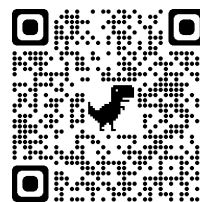
Be Informed

Prior to, during, and following a Hurricane or Severe Weather, make sure to pay attention to all emergency information and alerts that are provided either from Hurlburt Field or local news stations. Following a hurricane, roads may be closed or damaged, power lines may be down, and flooding may occur. Be aware of what is going on around you and do not leave your home until the all-clear is given.

Evacuation Procedures

Three types of evacuation:

- Voluntary (no reimbursement)
- Mandatory (reimbursable)

Wing Commander will give the order to Evacuate. One Evacuation Order is given, the authorized Safe Haven locations/distance will be announced.

Evacuation Responsibilities:

- Secure loose items from outdoors
- DO NOT leave pets behind
- DO NOT return until you have been recalled back to the area

Evacuation Contraflow

- During an Emergency Evacuation traffic lanes may be reversed so that all lanes can be used to travel inland

Pet Shelters
